Public Comment Period Begins

Shoreline Amphitheatre Gets Preliminary OK for Title V Permit

The Bay Area Air Quality Management District has made a preliminary decision to grant a Title V permit to the Shoreline Amphitheatre, located at One Amphitheatre Parkway in the City of Mountain View. The Shoreline Amphitheatre was constructed on top of a small portion of the closed Vista Landfill. The site has an active landfill gas collection system and other control measures. No waste has been placed in the Vista Landfill for more than 15 years.

The public comment period is from March 24, 2003 until April 28, 2003. During the public comment period, any member of the public may comment on any aspect of the proposed permit. A copy of the proposed permit can be found:

What is Title V?

Title V is part of the 1990 amendments to the Clean Air Act, and requires all state and local governments to develop and implement operating permits for all major pollution emitting facilities. The EPA oversees these permit programs and the Air District is charged with implementing them in the Bay Area, in accordance with Federal guidelines.

Title V is intended to clarify the complex air quality permitting process by consolidating the multitude of federal, state, and local air pollution control regulations into one summary operating permit that covers all aspects of a facility's year-to-year air pollution activities. The Title V operating permit program is implemented under Air District Regulation 2, Rule 6. Public comment is important to the Title V process. A final decision will incorporate consideration of public comments on the proposal.
