Mirant Delta Pittsburg Power Plant Title V Permit Public Comment Period Opens

The public comment period is from February 9, 2005 to March 11, 2005.

The Air District has completed its preliminary review of the Title V permit for the Mirant Delta Pittsburg Power Plant, located at 696 West 10th Street in Pittsburg. The permit has now advanced to the public comment stage of the Title V process. The facility is a power plant that produces a maximum 2,022 MW of electrical power for commercial sale and distribution. The facility also has miscellaneous maintenance sources, such as sandblasting, gasoline service station, emergency diesel generator, paint spray operation, sand blasting, solvent wipe cleaning operation, oil-water separator, cooling towers, and a dissolved air floating unit.

This is a re-issue of an existing permit. The public comment period is from February 9, 2005 to March 11, 2005. During the public comment period, any member of the public may comment on any aspect of the proposed permit. A copy of the proposed permit can be found:

What is Title V?

Title V is part of the 1990 amendments to the Clean Air Act, and requires all state and local governments to develop and implement operating permits for all major pollution emitting facilities. The EPA oversees these permit programs and the Air District is charged with implementing them in the Bay Area, in accordance with Federal guidelines.

Title V is intended to clarify the complex air quality permitting process by consolidating the multitude of federal, state, and local air pollution control regulations into one summary operating permit that covers all aspects of a facility's year-to-year air pollution activities. The Title V operating permit program is implemented under Air District Regulation 2, Rule 6. Public comment is important to the Title V process. A final decision will incorporate consideration of public comments on the proposal.
