Air District celebrates the 40th anniversary of the Clean Air Act

SAN FRANCISCO – This week marks the 40th anniversary of the Clean Air Act, a landmark law that serves to protect and improve air quality in the United States.

The Bay Area Air District was established in 1955 to deal with increasingly unhealthy air quality in the nine-county region. Since its passage in 1970, the Clean Air Act has spurred significant improvements in human health policies and lead to the implementation of increased environmental conservation efforts in the United States.

Since 1970, the law's impact can be measured in the Bay Area in several key ways, including:

- Ozone pollution has been reduced by one third, even though population and the economy have grown significantly.
- Public exposure to ozone pollution has decreased by 90 percent.
- Carbon monoxide, lead, nitrogen dioxide and sulfur dioxide have been effectively controlled and have not reached unhealthy levels for decades.
- In 1973, the Air District pioneered vapor recovery controls on gas pumps which are now used throughout the world. The Air District continues to pioneer innovative and cost-effective air quality controls.

In support of the Clean Air Act's 40th anniversary, the Air District will share with the public landmark achievements that have come from the District's work in support of the Clean Air Act in the last 40 years.
