## ***Winter Spare the Air Alert in effect for Thanksgiving Day*** *Use of wood-burning devices is prohibited*

**SAN FRANCISCO** – The Bay Area Air Quality Management District is issuing the season’s fourth *Winter Spare the Air Alert* for Thanksgiving Day, which bans burning wood, manufactured fire logs or any other solid fuel, both indoors and outdoors for 24 hours.

Current cool, stagnant weather conditions are trapping wood smoke pollution throughout the Bay Area.

“Unfortunately, weather conditions are expected to cause air pollution levels to climb to unhealthy levels on Thanksgiving Day,” said Jack Broadbent, executive officer of the Air District. “To protect our families and neighbors this Thanksgiving, it’s important that Bay Area residents refrain from wood burning.”

During this *Winter Spare the Air Alert*, it is illegal for Bay Area residents and businesses to use their fireplaces, woodstoves and inserts, pellet stoves, outdoor fire pits, or any other wood-burning devices. Homes without permanently installed heating, where woodstoves or fireplaces are the only source of heat, are exempt.

First-time violators will be given the option to take a wood smoke awareness class, online or by mail, to learn about the hazards of wood smoke pollution in lieu of paying a penalty. Second violations will result in a \$500 ticket and subsequent ticket amounts will be higher.

The public must check before they burn during the Winter Spare the Air season, which runs from November 1 through February 28. The daily burn status can be found:

In the winter, wood smoke from the 1.4 million fireplaces and wood stoves in the Bay Area is the single largest source of air pollution, contributing about one-third of the harmful fine particulate pollution in the air. Exposure to wood smoke—like cigarette smoke—has been linked to serious respiratory illnesses and even increased risk of heart attacks. Breathing fine particles accounts for more than 90 percent of premature deaths related to air pollution.

The Bay Area Air Quality Management District ([www.baaqmd.gov](http://www.baaqmd.gov)) is the regional agency responsible for protecting air quality in the nine-county Bay Area.
