<p>(1) Welcome and Opening Remarks (15 mins)</p>	<p>District 10 Supervisor-Shamann Walton Co-Lead from Bayview Hunters Point Community Advocates: Karen Pierce Co-Lead from Marie Harrison Community Foundation: Ariann Harrison</p>
<p>(2) Background and Context: AB 617 Community Emissions Reduction Program (30 mins)</p>	<p>Bay Area Air Quality Management District and California Air Resources Board (CARB) presented Blueprint 2.0 and the laws that guided Blueprint 2.0. They also discussed the background of Community Emission Reduction Programs (CERPs) and how this plan will work. Community Steering Committee (CSC) members will have 16 months to develop a CERP that is about 100 pages long with five chapters. Lastly, a timeline of this plan is given with 4 phases.</p>
<p>(3) Introduction Exercise (20 mins)</p>	<p>Attendees did a word match-up exercise, which allowed them to learn standard terms in this type of work and introduce themselves to each other.</p>
<p>(4) Steering Committee Member Role in Developing the Plan (20 mins)</p>	<p>The Steering Committee is expected to attend monthly meetings, define its leadership structure, and develop a charter.</p>

<p>Adjourn (15 mins)</p>	<p>How can we get more information on which issues other communities have prioritized? A: Members/participants can go onto other cities/counties' CERP webpages to see what they have done/prioritized.</p> <p>Is there a step for local adoption (district supervisors)? A: No formal step exists for the cities or counties to adopt the CERP. The CERP is only required to be adopted by the CSC and the Air District Board of Directors. Next, it is to be approved by CARB. Other local agencies are not involved. However, there is close collaboration with agencies to implement these strategies.</p> <p>Can technical staff attend meetings to tell us what data resources are available? A: The Air District will bring staff in deliberately and intentionally to support the plan development and answer community questions.</p>
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
