

# Bayview Hunters Point/Southeast San Francisco AB 617 Community Steering Committee Meeting #9 Summary

## 1. Meeting Agenda

### a. Welcome and Introductions 5:15 - 5:23

- i. Chalam and Karen Pierce (BVHPCA) welcomed everyone to the meeting and mentioned how they hoped this meeting would help everyone understand where they were in this CERP development process. He also wants members to think about how well they know each other on the committee, how often they speak to each other, and if they reach out for questions.
- ii. Decisions
  1. J. Michelle Pierce (BVHPCA) confirmed with the CSC if they were okay with the northern line, for the boundary being 16th street to Potrero down to the "water."
- iii. Next steps
  1. None.

### b. Sub-Committee Report Back 5:23 - 5:45

- i. The sub-committee reviewed the emissions inventory, focusing on pollutants PM 2.5 and DPM due to their significant risk to the community.
- ii. They requested maps and modeling from BAAQMD to identify potential pollution hotspots and better understand the sources.
- iii. The sub-committee emphasized that emissions inventory alone is insufficient and suggested considering fugitive dust as another harmful factor impacting the community.
- iv. Through their own mapping efforts, the sub-committee identified additional sources of pollution, including a data center on Paul Avenue not listed in the inventory, highlighting the need for continued multi-strategy approaches to address the various pollution sources in BVHP.
- v. Decisions
  1. None.
- vi. Next steps
  1. Mapping of Palou/Oakdale Corridor and Amador/Islais Creek; continue to review emissions inventory, categorize types of emissions, cross reference top contributors.

### c. Land Use Presentation 5:45 - 6:52

- i. Danielle Ngo and Jeremy Shaw from SF Planning continued their discussion on San Francisco's land use, focusing on long-range planning policies and the planning code for policy implementation.
- ii. Jeremy highlighted the importance of industrial land use, including Production, Distribution, and Repair (PDR), and discussed the rezoning of industrial areas in the early 2000s due to proximity to residential neighborhoods.
- iii. Danielle gave a historical overview of Bayview-Hunters Point (BVHP), from pre-colonial times through significant industrial developments like the shipyard, and its impact on the local economy and community.
- iv. The BVHP area's history of redevelopment, job loss, and environmental health impacts was emphasized, along with current efforts to address air pollution and social issues.
- v. J. Michelle encouraged CSC members to consider how protections for BIPOC communities are written into the CERP, given the historical displacement caused by redevelopment projects.
- vi. Decisions (if applicable)
  - 1. Augie proposed forming sub-committees for land use and health, with Chalam suggesting the sub-committees convene in November.
  - 2. A motion to create the new committees was proposed by Augie and seconded by Makayla, with Karen amending that the sub-committee begin after the CSC retreat.
  - 3. Chalam supported the amendment for the sub-committee to start after the retreat, and the motion was approved.
- vii. Next steps
  - 1. SF planning will share detailed versions of the land use maps with CSC members.

**d. Roadmap Discussion 6:52 - 7:15**

- i. Summary
  - 1. Marsha reviewed the CSC's accomplishments, including establishing a charter, selecting co-leads and chairs, setting boundaries, and learning about emissions, BAAQMD, and CARB responsibilities.
  - 2. She noted that CSC members still need to receive health data and information on health impacts.
  - 3. Marsha asked if members were okay with canceling the December meeting for the holidays, to which the CSC agreed.
  - 4. Augie raised concerns about addressing health topics if the December meeting is canceled and inquired about the retreat's timing.
  - 5. Marsha suggested holding the retreat on October 26, explaining it is meant for CSC members to connect and understand their collective power, with food, childcare, and transportation provided.
- ii. Decisions
  - 1. CSC Members Retreat will be on October 26, 2024.
  - 2. December Monthly CERP meeting is **canceled**.
  - 3. October and November meetings will be focused on health.
- iii. Action items/follow-up
  - 1. None.
