CERP Deadlines and Extension Request

Time Limitations per the Law

- AB 617: CERP must be adopted by the air district board within one year after CARB selection.
- AB 1749 added: CERP adoption can extend up to 2 years with agreement by the community, air district, and CARB.



Mapping (Nov Reporting)


- 284 places in Air District emissions inventory
- 315 places mapped in subcommittee,
- majority of which emit pollutants AND not currently regulated by Air District
 - Refrigeration-required shops such as cold storage facilities and produce/seafood wholesalers;
 - Building materials stores with stone, metal, concrete, and wood cutting
 - Mechanical auto repair (incl. Diesel trucks)
 - Airgas
- some of the mapped are supposed to be at least registered with Air District but aren't (at least 41)
 - Autobody shops (non exhaustive)
 - We found 22+ not in the original list of 48
 - Metal/demolition recycling (non exhaustive)
 - Cabinet painting (non exhaustive)
 - Food manufacturer (non exhaustive)
 - Breweries
 - Dry Cleaners

Mapping (Future considerations)



- Should the CSC spend time on having an extensive map (such as listing all Brownfield sites and vulnerable sites from monthly mapping meeting)
- Should we have a living map where community can continue to add sites to like East Oakland (<u>https://rspcerp.mysocialpinpoint.co</u> <u>m/east-oak/community-map</u>)

Mapping (Next Steps)



- Requests to form a subcommittee to
 conduct some cross-analysis between
 what's marked and the emissions
 inventory to see which businesses are
 missing from the inventory.
- Conduct further checks through Yelp and web-scraping, registration databases.
- i.e. Waymo Depot:
 - Not on the emissions inventory b/c they use mobile generators as backup instead of stationary
 - Cross-reference databases like Portable Equipment Registration Program

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Air District Health Officer



- Advises on health and environmental health science related policy matters, strategies, and communication
- Serves Communities, the Board of Directors and Committees, Staff, and Advisory Councils
- Only one staff member, the Health Officer
- Serves as the Air District's liaison with other agencies, especially health departments

Projects and Responsibilities



Examples:

- Support development of AB617 CERPs for all Communities (Bayview Hunters Point, East Oakland, Richmond - N. Richmond -San Pablo, West Oakland)
 - Review Community Health Profiles
 - Assist with development of CERP health strategies
 - Coordinate with other health agencies on CERP health strategies
 - Implementation and tracking of CERP health strategies

Projects and Responsibilities, cont.



Examples, cont.:

- Support the Advisory Council
- Work with Communications Division on Health Messaging
- Coordinate with County Health Officers on Health Messaging
- Track State and Federal Legislation related to Health

• Illegal Dumping – East Oakland CERP

 Health Strategies – Richmond/N. Richmond/San Pablo CERP

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Fugitive Dust - Operations and Activities of Concern

- Unpaved Roads
- Material Handling & Storage
- Material Transfer Processes







- Construction and Demolition Activities
- PM10 can pass through the throat and travel into the lungs and may cause adverse health effects

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East Oakland CERP Strategy – Health Effects of Illegal Dumping



Land, water, soil, and air pollution in the neighborhood:

- The chemicals and non-biodegradable materials in the waste affect the physical environment and the waterways by contaminating groundwater and soil.
- Chemicals, tires, household refuse, used automobile parts, hazardous medical waste, and green waste can increase the risk of fires.
- Site fire may have toxic air particles when hazardous materials combust.

Health Strategy from Path to Clean Air



Reducing Community Exposure to Air Pollution at Home:

- Action 1: Advocate that home retrofits programs reach all low-income households in the CERP Area
- Action 2: Assess if rental standards can require indoor air filtration and cooling in the CERP Area
- *Action 3:* Study how exposure reductions can reach the unhoused in the CERP Area
- Action 4: Reduce wood burning
- Action 5: Create incentives for electric home lawn and gardening equipment




Project Location at Southeast Treatment Plant





Project Objectives





- Improve odor, noise, and visual quality
- Address aging infrastructure with proven and efficient treatment technologies
- Maintain regulatory compliance
- Build critical processes with redundant infrastructure for reliability and operational flexibility
- Improve seismic reliability
- Beneficially use 100% of biosolids and biogas produced



Biosolids Project Environmental Justice Commitment

- SFPUC Environmental Justice Commitment = 3.0 tons/year
- Project estimated operational emissions = approx. 4.02 tons/year
- SFPUC Environmental Justice Commitment *potential* offsets needed = ~1.02 tons/year (actual amount to be determined by monitoring)

Collaboration with the Community Around PM2.5 Reduction and Offset Strategies

- Partner with the community to develop potential offset strategies
- Initial ideas* from our EJ Report and community conversations include:
 - Plant PM_{2.5} reducing trees and vegetation
 - Expand the electric vehicle charging station network and support electrification of surrounding industry
 - Provide indoor air quality filters for homes and businesses
 - Support replacement and maintenance of HEPA filters in schools
 - Expand community air quality monitoring
