

Land Use

Strategy objective is to eliminate the local disparity in exposure to air pollution in the "impact zones".

Action #12: The Air District and the West Oakland Environmental Indicators Project intends to implement the green infrastructure project currently under development between Interstate I-880 and the Prescott neighborhood in West Oakland.

WOCAP Strategy Example



Land Use

The goal of the Plan is to protect and improve community health by eliminating disparities in exposure to local air pollution.

Action #6: The City of Oakland uses incentives and subsidies to relocate businesses away from West Oakland that do not conform with the zoning designations adopted in the West Oakland Specific Plan. The Air District will provide emissions data and technical support to assist the City in these efforts and to ensure that any relocated businesses do not cause exposure issues at the new location.

Public Transit, Bike, and Pedestrian Infrastructure

<u>Strategy Objective</u>: Beginning in 2030, all community members who live or work in the Plan area have access to safe, affordable, and reliable alternatives to driving that allow community members to reach all their main destinations. These modes of travel include bus, rail, microtransit, and active transportation options that serve people of all abilities.

Action # Mobile 6.1: Zero Emission Bus Fleets by 2040. Complete transition to all-electric hybrid and/or hydrogen bus fleet on all routes within the PTCA area by 2040.

Path to Clean Air Strategy Example



Land Use

<u>Strategy Objective:</u> The goal of this strategy is to focus on land use regulations, conditions of approval, and protective zones to reduce the cumulative impact and concentration of polluting sources within the PTCA area. Recommended strategies will separate, buffer, and otherwise protect sensitive receptors and residential areas from existing and potential future pollution sources and exposure, with an intended outcome of improving community health for all, including disproportionately impacted communities.

Action# Land Use 1.2: Community-Informed Amortization. Develop a community-informed amortization approach and explore the use of zoning authority and incentives to relocate legal nonconforming polluting businesses away from residential areas in the PTCA area.

East Oakland Strategy Examples: Built Environment and Land Use

#3: Increasing Access to Clean Air and Resilience Resources During Extreme Weather

Strategy Objective: East Oakland community members have improved access to Clean and Cool Air Centers and resilience hub spaces, which are community-oriented facilities designed to provide support and resources during emergencies, helping residents stay safe and protect their health during wildfires and other extreme weather events. Backup power for individuals who rely on life-supporting medical devices, such as wheelchairs and oxygen tanks, is prioritized. These spaces are physically accessible and usable by everyone, regardless of their age or ability.

East Oakland Strategy Examples: Transportation & Mobile Sources

#5: Youth Environmental Justice Activism

<u>Strategy Objective:</u> Youth are educated about trucking- and freight-related issues to support intergenerational awareness of local air quality and environmental justice issues and to support continued advocacy.
