




What is the Healthy Development Guidelines?

- The Healthy Development Guidelines (HDG)
 is a proposed tool with specific standards and
 guidelines across a broad range of health
 and equity-related issues including housing,
 employment, environmental health and food
 access.
- The Planning Department, architects, developers and residents can use the HDG to ensure that development decisions are made in ways that improve individual and community health for all residents in Oakland.
- By adopting policies that intentionally promote community and equity in development decisions, the HDG project envisions a healthier, prosperous Oakland for everyone.

Background on the Healthy Development Guidelines


- 2005: The inception of the Healthy Development Guidelines started with protest of selling the 16th Street Station which led to air filtration being added to St. Mary's Gardens Housing expansion.
- 2010: Oakland City Council proposed a resolution for City Planning to partner with Alameda County Public Health Department to work towards a Health Element for the General Plan.
- 2014: Healthy Development Guidelines process launched.

1. New warehouses and truck related businesses, provide contained loading docks and truck entrances into the building, and locate them at least 500 feet from adjacent sensitive uses such as residential, schools, daycare centers, parks and medical facilities							
2. As required in the Standard Conditions of Approval: Reduce exposure to air pollution, incorporate measures to improve indoor air quality and reduce exposure to air pollution in new development projects							
3. Increased tree canopy. Incorporate tree plantings on the site and adjacent street frontage as specified by <i>OMC</i> Chapter 17,124

 4.For transit-rich projects, developers will be offered reduced parking ratio requirements for; Offering a bulk discounted rate transit passes from AC Transit for all occupants including residents and workers. Contribution of funds, to be used to build transit demand strategies improvements (i.e. car share, bike racks) that must remain functional for at least 25 years or go into additional community benefits fund.





Goals of plan

- 1. Keep the Port competitive, financially sustainable, and a catalyst for jobs and economic development.
- Minimize emissions of criteria air pollutants and toxic air contaminants (TACs), with a focus on reducing DPM emissions.
- Reduce Greenhouse Gas emissions.
- 4. Build and strengthen partnerships among the Port, tenants, equipment manufacturers, owners and operators, community organizations, regulatory agencies, and the public.
- Provide opportunities for meaningful stakeholder engagement

Builds upon the Port's previous 2009 Maritime Air Quality Improvement Plan (MAQIP)

- Continues focus on diesel particulate matter (DPM) reductions. MAQIP goal was a -85% reduction and we are currently at -81% reduction in DPM.
- Announces a pathway towards a zero-emission Seaport
- Continued stakeholder engagement and partnerships through Plan implementation

Shore Power

- Jan.- Nov. 2018: 74% Successful Vessel Plug-In
- Goal of 90% Success
- Criteria pollutants reduced in 2017: -600 tons per year (tpy).
- CO2e (carbon dioxide equivalents) reduced in 2017:
 -21,800 tpy.

Moyer Grant (June 2018: Contract executed)

- 13 Hybrid rubber tired gantry (RTG) Cranes.
- Criteria pollutants: -45 tpy.
- CO2e: -1,200 tpy.

(ZANZEFF) Grant (January 24 Board meeting)

- 10 zero-emissions Class 8 drayage trucks and 10 chargers.
- 5 zero-emissions yard trucks
- 1 zero-emissions top handler
- Related electrical infrastructure
- Criteria pollutants: -8 tpy
- CO2e: -940 tpy



Bill Aboudi -- There needed to be a lot more detail on the forms. If they are spending \$\$ to make trucks efficient, what are they spending it on?

Andy Katz -- I had great experience at the port and WOSP tables, but I didn't feel there was a venue to discuss compliance with existing truck routes.

Pat McGowan -- the TMP table started talking about land use strategies that can be used to help truck businesses move out of Oakland, but moving the businesses out means moving the jobs away. We may need to tighten the regulations that all trucks must follow. -- such as state level standards.
