




Explore the 35 land use strategies

Today, Owning Our Air contains 35 strategies addressing land use issues, with a particular focus on targeting industrialized sources of air pollution.



The Port is one of the largest sources of air pollution in West Oakland




Top emissions sources in West Oakland in 2017 (source: "Owning Our Air: The West Oakland Community Action Plan vol. 2," 2019)




Explore the port and freight strategies

Today, *Owning Our Air* contains 37 strategies addressing port and freight solutions, with a particular focus on targeting mobile sources like cargo handling, building an electrical infrastructure, and truck management. The plan also identifies several enforcement strategies and at least one area requiring further study.




Explore the health and living buffer strategies

The West Oakland Community Action Plan has adopted 19 strategies addressing health-specific solutions that range from improving indoor air filtration to planting trees and other "living buffers" that help absorb toxic air pollution. The plan also identifies key areas requiring further study.





Explore the bike, walk and transit strategies


The West Oakland Community Action Plan has adopted 11 strategies aimed at encouraging and supporting residents to use non-polluting transit alternatives and improving their safety when they do. These include incentives and grants for replacing gas-guzzling cars with more efficient vehicles, improving public transportation and neighborhood bicycle infrastructure, requiring private development to address transit infrastructure, and more.





POTENTIAL BARRIERS AND SOLUTIONS

Community members' resources and capacities:

- New residents vs. historical populations
- Different levels of resources, capacity, political capital, and leadership capabilities

Accessibility:

- Transportation, language, technological, institutional, and physical barriers
- Residents with disabilities, youth, older adults, etc.

Cultural and racial diversity:

 Varying methods of information sharing and engagement opportunities for cultural differences

Disparate environmental factors:

- Air quality issues can vary from block to block
- Urgency level may be different for different residents
