Selection of Advisory Councilmembers

Review of California Health and Safety Code Sections 40000

- California Health and Safety Code, Sections 40260-40268:
- Council shall consist of:
 - Air District Board of Directors Chair, who shall serve as an exofficio member
 - Seven members who shall be skilled and experienced in the fields of air pollution, climate change, or the health impacts of air pollution
 - Members shall be selected to include a diversity of perspectives, expertise, and backgrounds

Review of California Health and Safety Code (cont.)

• California Health and Safety Code, Sections 40260-40268 (cont.):

- Council members shall hold office for a term of two years and until the appointment and qualification of their successor
- Shall meet not less than four times a year

Background on Recruitment



- Positions were posted on the Air District website on June 29, 2020
- Notices were posted on recruiting sites
- Community groups were encouraged to notify qualified individuals
- Air District sent an eblast to over 1,000 interested stakeholders
- Received feedback from Ad Hoc Committee on Equity, Access, and Inclusion and community to recruit more diverse candidates in November 2020
- Air District continued recruiting through the winter, encouraging additional applicants
- Recruitment closed February 2021

Review of Qualified Candidates



- Air District staff completed initial screening of qualifications
- Panel of community advocates completed a screening of qualified candidates and provided rankings
- Board members and community panel completed interviews with 13 candidates in May 2021

Board of Directors Selection of Candidates



- The Interview Panel recommends the following three incumbents be reappointed to serve an additional two-year term to the Air District's Advisory Council:
 - Gina M. Solomon, M.D., M.P.H.
 - Michael T. Kleinman, Ph.D.
 - Linda Rudolph, M.D., M.P.H.




Recommend the Board of Directors:

- Authorize the Executive Officer/APCO to enter into a contract with the CARB not to exceed \$5 million for the purposes of accepting Assembly Bill (AB) 836 funding for Clean Air Centers
- Authorize:
 - That the \$1 million reserve for "Woodsmoke" in the Fiscal Year Ending (FYE) 2022 Budget be redesignated to fund a Wildfire Preparedness Program; and
 - That the Executive Officer/APCO to enter into or expand contracts or agreements with Bay Area Counties and the Red Cross to expend this funding.

2021 Fire Season Outlook






Low rainfall in the Bay Area

- 2020-2021 season (as of May 27, 2021): only ~35% of typical rainfall
- 2019-2020 season: 49% of typical rainfall

Potential fuels for fire will be dry earlier in the year

2021 Fire Season Likely to Start Earlier





Northern California Geographic Coordination Center

By July: Higher risk of wildfire in mid/upper elevations

Sept. – Nov.:

Depends on severity of offshore wind events and when the next rainy season starts

AB 836 – Clean Air Centers



- Wildfire Smoke Clean Air Centers for Vulnerable Populations
 Incentive Pilot Program
 - Retrofit ventilation systems to create a network of clean air centers to mitigate the adverse public health impacts due to wildfires and other smoke events.
 - Eligible: Schools, Community Centers, Senior Centers, Sports centers, Libraries.

AB 836 – Clean Air Centers (cont.)



- CARB guidelines
 - Funding for HVAC retrofits, portable air filtration units and replacement filters
 - Funding to vulnerable populations (i.e. low-income, disadvantaged communities, facilities open for sheltering and evacuation)
 - Selection criteria and funding prioritization (i.e. location of facility, facility capacity, etc.)
 - Program reporting requirements by Air District and grantees

Funding and CARB Engagement



- \$5 million Funding for AB 836 Clean Air Centers Provided in FYE 2020 California State Budget
- CARB Engagement:
 - June 2020 Legislative Officer meets with CARB to explain AB 836
 - September 2020 Air District provides program strategies and guidelines
 - September 2020 May 2021 Multiple meetings CARB and CAPCOA
 - June 2021 ARB hosts 2 public workshops and releases draft guidelines
 - July 2021 ARB plans to send draft contracts and final guidelines
 - No program funds can be expended prior to a signed contract
- Funds will likely not be deployed in time for 2021 Wildfire Season

Wildfire Preparedness Program



- Focus on helping in Emergencies
- Deploy portable Air Filters with County Emergency Services and the Red Cross
 - Provide air filtration units to be deployed at evacuation, sheltering and congregate facilities during wildfire events
 - Air District moving in parallel to conduct RFQ for large portable filters
- Redesignate \$1 million woodsmoke reserve for the wildfires program

 \circ \$100,000 per county for portable filters

Partnerships with Counties and Red Cross



- Discussions with County OES Managers
 - Response overwhelmingly positive
 - Concerns regarding program timeline Seeking MOUs by August 1
 - Internal coordination needed to manage filter storage and deployment
 - Filters will likely be deployed in various locations
 evacuation, sheltering and congregation facilities
 - Counties are discussing the logistics and coordination needed; Some counties work with Red Cross and may need to expand existing agreements





Recommend the Board of Directors:

- Authorize the Executive Officer/APCO to enter into a contract with the California Air Resources Board not to exceed \$5 million for the purposes of accepting Assembly Bill 836 funding for Clean Air Centers
- Authorize:
 - That the \$1 million reserve for "Woodsmoke" in the Fiscal Year Ending (FYE) 2022 Budget be redesignated to fund a Wildfire Preparedness Program; and
 - That the Executive Officer/APCO to enter into or expand contracts or agreements with Bay Area Counties and the Red Cross to expend this funding.

Updated Messaging is

- Clear
- Concise
- Consistent with County Health Officers

Staying indoors with windows and doors closed is the best way to protect your health, if temperatures allow. During high heat and heavy smoke events, keep indoor air cool or visit a cleaner air-cooling center.

- If you have a Heating, Ventilation, Air Conditioning (HVAC) system, set air conditioning units and car vent systems to recirculate to prevent outside air from moving inside.
- Consider purchasing a non-ozone producing air purifier (HEPA) to create a cleaner air room in the home or a Minimum Efficiency Reporting Value (MERV) 13 or greater filter for an HVAC system.







Masks are not a substitute for staying indoors and must be fitted properly for best protection.

- Masks can provide a false sense of security and may not provide the protection needed.
- Bandanas and typical surgical
 masks do little to protect against
 wildfire smoke particles.
- Certified N95 masks are
 currently not approved for
 children new mask guidance for
 children is currently under
 consideration.

Mask Messaging (cont.)

If unable to visit a cleaner air center or a cooling center, those that must be outside for extended periods of time may benefit from using a tight fitting N95 mask to reduce their exposure.

 - Supporting community-based solutions that reduce air pollution
 - Expansion in recent years

Current Community Engagement Grant Programs (cont.)





James Cary Smith Grants

- Launched in 2016
- Local air quality improvement and education projects
- One-year grants of up to \$25,000
- To date, 42 grants awarded to community-based organizations

Current Community Engagement Grant Programs (cont.)





Community Health Protection Grants

- Pilot launched in 2019
- Prepare communities to partner with Air District on emissions reduction efforts
- 7 grantees from Assembly Bill (AB) 617 high priority Communities
- \$50,000 each for one year
- Grants extended for an additional year and \$50,000

2021 Grant Program Evaluation



- Goals: Learn about what is working and what needs improvement
- Process: Focus groups and web-based survey
- Identified opportunities to:
 - Improve grant processes
 - Increase access to grant funding
 - Better support impacted communities

- Key Takeaways from June 3, 2021 Community Equity, Health and Justice (CEHJ) Committee Meeting:
 - Prioritization of disadvantaged communities
 - Outreach
 - Technical assistance
 - Program evaluation

Proposed Path Forward



- Offer one aligned grant program
 - Award up to \$750,000 total in Community Engagement grants per year
 - Support local/regional capacity-building efforts
 - Offer multi-year grant awards
 - Increase available grant amounts
- Make grant funding more accessible and equitable
 - Expand outreach efforts; create application template
 - Offer technical assistance to applicants






• Grants should build community leadership around air quality concerns and strengthen community's ability to lead future emissions and exposure reduction efforts.

7 of 10 most ozone-polluted cities in the U.S. are in California

1 million annual California student school absences related to air pollution

4 times as likely Californians are to experience serious air pollution-related health problems

Californians CARE about air quality

- 72% of Californians said air pollution in California was a problem
- **59%** of Californians said air pollution in their region posed a serious health risk to their immediate family
- 81% said it was necessary to take steps to counter the effects of global warming right away


