

The Device: Clarity Node-S Sensors

Data will be collected and analyzed through 15 Clarity Node-S sensors.

Through our Technical Partner Clarity Movement, equipment and methods have already been field tested and deployed in various environments. Clarity is technically proficient, having deployed in 70+ cities and throughout 40+ countries.

Data Collection

Brightline will site 15 Clarity-Node S sensors and collect air quality data.

Partners will meet on a quarterly basis to review the data.

Data Analysis

Brightline will analyze the air quality data and work with the City to distribute air quality information to residents about immediate and long-term risk factors.



Survey Results

Based on nearly 300 survey responses from SRO Tenant Leaders, Tenderloin residents, and community workers we can conclude that the majority of respondents (79.1%) agree that air quality in their neighborhood has negatively impacted their health.








Report's Summary

In last year, San Francisco's air quality is fair; The season that has **the worst** air quality is **summer.**






About **70%** of people agree that SF's air pollution has affected their **health condition**



On August 19, 2020 Governor Newsom declared a state of emergency after an unusual lightning storm and a historic heatwave led to an especially fierce fire season.

At the time of the press conference California was battling 367 known fires.

By Wednesday, fires were burning in every Bay Area county except urban San Francisco. As a result, the SF Bay Area was experiencing the worst air quality in the world that day.







Impoverished SF Communities Get New Air Quality Sensors — Just in Time for Smoke-Clogged Skies

In response to the wildfires, Brightline quickly deployed its first 7 sensors across Tenderloin, SoMa, and the Richmond District to start capturing critical air quality data for community health.

Air Quality Index

The Air Quality Index (AQI) is a representation of air pollution concentration levels. It assigns numbers on a scale between 0 and 500 and is used to help determine when air quality is expected to be unhealthy. Each AQI number refers to specific amounts of pollution in the air. If the concentration of a pollutant rises above 100, air quality can be unhealthy for the public.



Health impacts are not expected when air quality is in this range.

51-100 Moderate

Unusually sensitive people should consider limiting prolonged outdoor exertion.

101-150 Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups

Active children and adults, and people with respiratory disease such as asthma, should limit outdoor exertion.

151-200 Unhealthy

Everyone, especially children, should limit prolonged outdoor exertion.

201-300 Very Unhealthy


Everyone, especially children, should limit outdoor exertion.

301-500 Very Unhealthy

Emergency conditions: everyone avoid outdoor physical activity.


Sensor Network



Wildfire Impacts

- Wildfires have presented an extremely noticeable effect on the AQI and PM 2.5 concentrations across all neighborhoods.
- Air quality significantly declined in every neighborhood during the wildfires, however, SoMa had the highest AQI in comparison to the other neighborhoods.











COVID-19 Impacts

 San Francisco faces higher air pollution (PM10) than Berkeley or Redwood City, even with reduced traffic due to COVID-19.

- In the absence of major policy changes, we risk a rapid rebound of emissions in 2021.
- Clean energy and a transition to a green economy will be critical to ensure a sustainable recovery.





Air Quality Matters

Long term exposure to air pollution increases your risk of cardiac disease, your risk of strokes, your risk of asthma exacerbations, and reduces your life expectancy

CalEnviroScreen (CES) 3.0 and CES Draft 4.0

>Under CES 3.0, only two of the eight census tracts in the Tenderloin were classified as Disadvantaged Communities. But under Draft CES 4.0, there are zero census tracts scoring in the top quartile.

>Pollution risk and other environmental and socioeconomic factors persist as a serious threat in SoMa. But Draft CES 4.0 now disqualifies both of SoMa's four census tracts previously in the top quartile under CES 3.0, while one census tract has a score that barely exceeds the 75th percentile.

>Workshops underway from April 7-20, Bay Area Workshop is April 20, public comment due April 30th.

- The Board of Directors at its March 4, 2020, meeting established the Ad Hoc Committee on Equity and Environmental Justice for one year with a sunset of becoming a full committee if agreed upon, if not agreed upon after one year, a second year granted.
- The Board of Directors merged elements of its "Community and Public Health Committee" and the "Ad Hoc Committee on Equity, Access and Inclusion Committees" to form a new standing Community Equity, Health & Justice Committee.

Mission Statement



Community Equity, Health & Justice Committee ... "will advise the Board of Directors regarding equitable and inclusive actions the Air District takes to create a healthy breathing environment for all people of the Bay Area, regardless of race, ethnicity, age, gender identity, national origin, immigration status, or sexual orientation.

The Community Equity, Health & Justice Committee will oversee staff efforts in developing policies for both internal and external operations, which impact the Bay Area. Internal operations include applying an equity lens to programs, policies, practices, and procedures related to staffing, recruitment, promotions, inclusive practices in the workplace, contracting for capital projects and services, and continuous racial equity training. External operations include addressing disparities by applying an equity lens to Air District programs, policies, practices, and procedures.

The Committee will prioritize traditionally marginalized and disinvested communities for investment opportunities to ensure communities highly impacted by air pollution receive program and policy prioritization.

The Committee will also recommend to the Board of Directors overall direction of the District's public engagement programs. In addition, the Committee hears proposals and makes recommendations to the Board of Directors regarding the selection of contractor(s) to assist the District with aspects of the public engagement programs."

Purpose



Background



- On February 19, 2021, the Community Equity, Health & Justice Committee (Committee) reviewed applications for the Path to Clean Air CERP Steering Committee.
- Less than 24 hours before the meeting, Air District staff were notified that the representative from the Contra Costa County Health Services Agency could no longer serve on the Steering Committee.
- The Committee voted to approve a slate of 31 members for Board of Directors approval. The slate consisted of 30 identified members, and one seat for a representative from the Health Services Agency to be appointed at a later date.
