4. James Cary Smith Community Grant Program Update

Grantees are implementing capacity-building projects which improve local air quality and health outcomes in local environmental justice communities. Re: James Cary Smith Community Grant Program Update

RECOMMENDED ACTION

No action is requested at this time.

BACKGROUND

The Air District operates a unique, multiyear grant program supporting community-based organizations to implement capacity-building projects in environmental justice communities. The Community Grant Program was launched in 2009, and was renamed in 2016 to honor James Cary Smith. Mr. Smith was the Air District's former Community Outreach Manager, and passed away in 2015 from ALS. The program extends his vision of a more engaged and empowered community.

The Air District has refined its approach to grantmaking over the past decade based on findings from program evaluations, recommendations from community partners, and best practices for equity-based grantmaking. From 2019 to 2021, the Air District operated two community grant programs concurrently: the James Cary Smith (JCS) Community Grant Program, and the Community Health Protection Grant Program. To reduce confusion and strengthen partnerships with community-based organizations, in 2021, the Air District's Board of Directors authorized a realignment of community grants. Staff then consolidated the two grant programs to create one aligned JCS Community Grant Program, with the goal of maximizing the ability of environmental justice communities to engage fully with the Air District and other public agencies.

As part of the program realignment, the Air District increased the maximum amount for individual grants, provided multiyear grants, and offered ongoing support and technical assistance to organizations during the application process and the grant cycle. Year 1 of the current grant cycle launched in 2022 and funded 33 grantees, and a subset of the original grant cohort has been eligible to continue funded projects. Eligible grantees must have demonstrated progress toward project goals and deliverables and continue capacity-building projects in environmental justice communities where there are no programs to implement Assembly Bill (AB) 617. Due to these geographic constraints, there has been a decrease in the number of

grantees over the course of the program, which was anticipated. Year 3 is currently funding 20 grantees, and is anticipated to conclude in Summer 2025. Year 3 will overlap with the next JCS Request for Applications, scheduled to launch in October 2024 to recruit a new cohort of grantees.

The Air District prioritized funding for projects based in local environmental justice communities, including communities awaiting AB 617 designation, and projects based in communities with an overall score of 70 to 100 in CalEnviroScreen 4.0. Grantees are using JCS Community Grant Program funds to develop and deepen capacity-building efforts that seek to address air quality concerns in communities that have historically faced inequitable pollution impacts. Attachment 1, Table 1, provides additional information on funded projects.

DISCUSSION

As part of this agenda item, staff will provide an update on the refocused JCS Community Grant Program, including an overview of the current grant cycle, program evaluation findings, and information about the next Request for Applications. In addition, two JCS community grantees, Urban Habitat and Citizen Air Monitoring Network, will discuss their funded projects and how they are building capacity in local environmental justice communities.

Current Grant Cycle (FYE 2022 – 2024)

The Board of Directors approved 35 JCS Community Grant awards - including the current grant cohort - on November 3, 2021, and on December 1, 2021. These grant awards span up to three years and afford the Board of Directors and staff the flexibility to cancel or suspend funding to grantees in any year. Funding for these grants is currently drawn from the Air District's general funds. On June 7, 2023, the Board of Directors approved the budget for the Fiscal Year Ending (FYE) 2024, which included funding for Year 3 of the JCS Community Grant Program. Year 3 of the program is currently funding the 20 grantees who have demonstrated progress toward project goals and deliverables, and who will continue capacity-building projects in environmental justice communities where there are not programs to implement Assembly Bill (AB) 617.

It is important to note that the capacity-building projects supported by this grant are closely tied to AB 617 efforts. Following the California Air Resources Board's designation of East Oakland on February 11, 2022, the Air District partnered with a Year 1 JCS grantee, Communities for a Better Environment, as well as community steering committee members to develop a Community Emission Reduction Plan (CERP) for East Oakland. Since East Oakland's designation, there has been an ongoing focused investment in that community through the CERP process. Therefore, grant projects focused on East Oakland were not eligible to continue past Year 1 of the grant program.

On February 23, 2023, the California Air Resources Board designated Bayview Hunters Point/Southeast San Francisco as the next Bay Area community to develop a CERP. In January 2024, the Air District partnered with two organizations to launch a community steering committee in Bayview Hunters Point/Southeast San Francisco to develop a CERP for that area.

Since Bayview Hunters Point's designation, there has been an ongoing focused investment in that community through the CERP process. Therefore, grant projects focused on Bayview Hunters Point/Southeast San Francisco were not eligible to continue past Year 2 of the grant program.

Program Components

The Air District offers a number of supports to JCS grantees, including convenings and workshops, office hours, and ongoing customized technical assistance. In 2023, staff and grantees launched a JCS Grantee Coalition that meets quarterly, bolstering grantee efforts to share information and collaborate across geographies. Staff also launched a Google Group to help grantees share resources with each other. In addition, the Air District created a Grantee Resource Library to enable grantees to easily share project materials.

Program Evaluation Findings

The Air District has contracted with RDA Consulting ("RDA") to monitor and evaluate the realignment of the JCS Community Grant Program. Since 2022, RDA has conducted annual grantee focus groups and questionnaires, analyzed grantee report data, and interviewed key stakeholders to identify program successes and areas for improvement. Evaluation findings have been positive and demonstrate that the JCS Community Grant Program is helping the Air District effectuate several goals outlined in the new strategic plan framework, including achieving impact and advancing environmental justice.

Next Grant Cycle (FYE 2025)

Staff plan to launch the next Request for Applications for the JCS Community Grant Program in October 2024, using FYE 2025 funds. After a selection panel has reviewed and scored proposals, staff will bring the list of projects selected for awards and draft grant agreements to the Board of Directors in Spring 2025 for approval.

James Cary Smith

- The Community Grants Program is named for Jim Smith, the Air District's former Community Outreach Manager.
- Mr. Smith passed away in 2015 from amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), and the program extends his vision of more engaged and empowered communities.



James Cary Smith

JCS Community Grant Program

- Unique, multiyear grant program supporting community-based organizations – the majority of them Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC)-led – to implement capacity-building projects in environmental justice (EJ) communities.
- The Air District has embraced recommendations from community partners and external evaluators to strengthen and refine its community grant program over the past ten years.

Background on Grant Program

- From 2019 2021, the Air District operated two community grant programs concurrently: James Cary Smith Community Grant Program & Community Health Protection Grant Program.
- To reduce confusion and strengthen partnerships with community-based organizations (CBOs), in 2021 the Air District consolidated the programs, creating one aligned JCS Community Grant Program.
- The inaugural 3-year grant cycle launched in 2022, and will conclude in Summer 2025. The next Request For Applications (RFA) is scheduled for Fall 2024.

Current Grant Cycle

- Grants awarded to projects based in Bay Area EJ communities
- Wide range of capacity-building projects serving diverse populations
- Multiyear grants; up to \$100,000 per grantee per year
- \$6.4 million to 33 projects over 3 years



Approaches to Building Capacity

Assessing Community Needs

Gathering information on community priorities, concerns, and values

Supporting Leaders

Sustaining engagement with multiple touchpoints over time

Facilitating Community Education

Connecting with community members to introduce topics of air quality and environmental justice

Activating Community Outreach Workers

Community leaders increasing community participation and capacity

- Ongoing customized support for grantees via workshops, office hours, and technical assistance
- Grantee Coalition meetings held quarterly
- Grantee Google group to share resources & funding opportunities
- Grantee Resource Library

Evaluation Findings

- Grant funding is leveraging local capacity and expertise
- Grant funds are reaching and impacting diverse communities
- The Air District expanded the grant program's reach into EJ communities
