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Air District issues another Spare the Air Smog Alert

Commuters urged to find alternatives to driving alone

SAN FRANCISCO – Today, the Bay Area Air Quality Management District is issuing its fifth *Spare the Air Alert* for smog in 2017.

Air quality is forecast to be unhealthy again tomorrow, Friday, June 23. High pressure over Northern California is expected to produce temperatures in the upper 90s inland. Light winds and hot temperatures throughout the day are expected to cause unhealthy ozone levels in the East Bay region. The heatwave that has impacted the Bay Area this week is expected to ease late Friday, with cooler temperatures for the weekend. **There is no free transit tomorrow and there is no wood burning ban in place.**

"The heatwave that continues this week in the Bay Area will again cause unhealthy air quality in the region," said Jack Broadbent, executive officer of the Air District. "As extreme temperatures become more commonplace due to climate change, we need to stop driving alone and find better options like carpooling or transit to reduce air pollution."

Spare the Air Alerts are called when ozone pollution is forecast to reach unhealthy levels. Ozone, or smog, can cause throat irritation, congestion, chest pain, trigger asthma, inflame the lining of the lungs and worsen bronchitis and emphysema. Long-term exposure to ozone can reduce lung function. Ozone pollution is particularly harmful for young children, seniors and those with respiratory and heart conditions.

When a *Spare the Air Alert* is called, outdoor exercise should be done only in the early morning hours when ozone concentrations are lower. Residents are encouraged to reduce air pollution every day by rethinking their commute and avoiding driving alone.
