Air District issues third consecutive Spare the Air smog alert

Extreme heat, light winds expected to trigger unhealthy air quality

SAN FRANCISCO – Today, the Bay Area Air Quality Management District is issuing its twelfth *Spare the Air Alert* for smog in 2017.

Air quality is forecast to be unhealthy again tomorrow, Saturday, September 2. A high-pressure ridge is over the region, leading to extremely hot, triple-digit temperatures inland and light, offshore winds. These conditions, coupled with smoke from Northern California and Oregon wildfires, are expected to cause unhealthy ozone levels throughout the Bay Area. The Air District has also issued a smoke advisory for the Labor Day weekend. There is no free transit tomorrow and there is no wood burning ban in place.

"Serious air quality impacts are expected throughout the Bay Area due to smog from high temperatures and smoke from wildfires in Northern California and Oregon," said Jack Broadbent, executive officer of the Air District. "We recommend Bay Area residents avoid unnecessary exposure to unhealthy air by limiting outdoor activities, especially during the hottest part of the day or if they smell smoke."

Bay Area residents impacted by the heat should follow the advice of local health officials to find cooling centers in their area.

Spare the Air Alerts are called when ozone pollution is forecast to reach unhealthy levels. Ozone, or smog, can cause throat irritation, congestion, chest pain, trigger asthma, inflame the lining of the lungs and worsen bronchitis and emphysema. Long-term exposure to ozone can reduce lung function. Ozone pollution is particularly harmful for young children, seniors and those with respiratory and heart conditions.

When a *Spare the Air Alert* is called, outdoor exercise should be done only in the early morning hours when ozone concentrations are lower. Residents are encouraged to reduce air pollution every day by rethinking their commute and avoiding driving alone.
