

# People's Air Grant Program Request for Applications Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

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## A) Air District Information

### ***A1: Can you please share how I can subscribe to receive notifications directly of recently released funding opportunities?***

## B) Allowable Costs

### ***B1: I see that the overhead limit is 15%. Is that true even if the organization has a NICRA rate for higher than that?***

Indirect costs are allowable for up to 15% of the project's total budget, even if the organization's NICRA rate exceeds that. For more information, please see Section 8.3 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications.

### ***B2: Do you have a limit on overhead or administrative costs (which can be higher for projects with a (c)(3) cost)?***

Yes. Indirect costs are allowable up to 15% of the project's total budget. For more information, please see Section 8.3 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications.

### ***B3: Among ineligible costs, you state: "Public lobbying that seeks to build political support among the general public for an issue or candidate." Is cost for direct action organizing or negotiating with corporate polluters (in target areas) allowed?***

No. Costs associated with direct action organizing or negotiating with corporate polluters are not eligible for funding through the People's Air Grant Program.

### ***B4: For the Peoples Air Grant Program, are the subgrantee (local government agency) limited to 15% indirect costs in their own budget?***

Applicants will submit one project budget that includes all project costs, including those of the Subgrantee. The 15% indirect cost limit applies to the overall project budget. ## C) Applicant Eligibility

### ***C1: Can you please repeat the Lead Grantees?***

Eligible Lead applicants include nonprofit organizations holding current tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, including community-based organizations. Please see Sections 6.2 and 6.3 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications for exceptions. Other eligible Lead Applicants include local government agencies such as cities, counties, joint powers authorities, special districts, councils of governments, and other public agencies; local public schools and public school districts; and California Native American tribes.

### ***C2: If our fiscal sponsor has received a James Cary grant, are we ineligible for this grant?***

Recipients of a James Cary Smith Community Grant from the Air District are not eligible to apply as a Lead Applicant or Subgrantee, so your fiscal sponsor would not be eligible.

### ***C3: If an organization that was awarded funding through the James Cary Smith community grant program as a subgrantee, as opposed to a lead, would this organization be ineligible as a lead or subgrantee for the People's Air Grant Program?***

Organizations that have received James Cary Smith Community Grant funds from the Air District as a Subgrantee are not eligible to apply as a Lead Applicant or Subgrantee for a People's Air Grant.

### ***C4: We previously received funding for the Clean Air Center program. Would we still be eligible for this one? Thanks.***

To ensure our team provides the most accurate information, please email your organization's name to the People's Air Grant Team at [peoplesairgrant@baaqmd.gov](mailto:peoplesairgrant@baaqmd.gov) so we can verify your eligibility.

### ***C5: [Our organization] has received these Bay Area Air Quality Management District grants in the past:***

- 1) Educate community regarding low cost air monitoring system \$25K***
- 2) 2019: another grant for \$25K? (couldn't find grant number or grant program name). Unfortunately, these pre-dated me and my team's time at [our organization]. Would it be possible for you to find out from your end, and let us know it affects our eligibility for this RFP?***

The Air District's records do not show that [organization name] has received a James Cary Smith Community Grant. Organizations and entities that have not been awarded funding through the Air District's James Cary Smith Community Grant Program and/or the California Air Resources Board's Community Air Grant Program are eligible to apply for a People's Air Grant as either a Lead

Applicant or a Subgrantee if they meet the other eligibility requirements noted in the People's Air Grant Request for Applications.

***C6: Can a group apply if fiscally sponsored by a 501c3 nonprofit that would otherwise be eligible? For example, can [Project Name] apply with our fiscal sponsor [Organization Name]? Or in partnership with another nonprofit? We are in the process of setting up our nonprofit now!***

Yes, an organization that is eligible to apply as a Lead Applicant may serve as a fiscal sponsor. The fiscally-sponsored organization would be considered a Subgrantee for the People's Air Grant Program. Organizations that are not yet established as a 501(c)(3) may participate through an eligible fiscal sponsor. ***C7: I'm new to our organization. Is there someone at the Air District who can tell me if we've been an Assembly Bill 617 recipient in the past?***

To ensure our team provides the most accurate information, please submit the name of your organization to the People's Air Grant Team via email so that we can check your eligibility: [peoplesairgrant@baaqmd.gov](mailto:peoplesairgrant@baaqmd.gov).

***C8: We fiscally sponsor another organization that is also planning to apply. Would there be any issues with both organizations submitting applications?***

A Lead Applicant may submit one application for funding. If an organization serves as a Lead Applicant (including as a fiscal sponsor), it may not submit multiple applications. For more information, please see Section 6 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications.

***C9: Can you please go back to Question 2 [the second field under the Lead Application section of the online application] of eligibility requirements.***

***C10: [Project name] has been an activism project of mine through my consulting business. Last year I started a nonprofit that supports all of my creative community projects, called [Nonprofit name], of which [Project name] is now an initiative. Question: when I apply, should I put [Nonprofit name] as the entity? Or should I put [Project name] as the entity and [Nonprofit name] as the fiscal sponsor?***

The Lead Applicant for an application would be the fiscal sponsor for a project without tax-exempt status. The application also has fields to include information for the fiscally sponsored entity. For more information, please see Section 6 in the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, and the Application Questions in Appendix A.

***C11: Is it possible for a grantee to be too small to apply? To what extent is organization size a factor in scoring?***

There are no requirements around the size of an organization that applies for a People's Air Grant. If awarded a grant, a Lead Applicant (and its fiscal sponsor, if applicable) should be prepared to implement the funded project and comply with the terms and conditions in the grant agreement, for example, maintenance of a financial management system and maintenance of insurance. ***C12: I'm writing to request clarification regarding the eligibility language in the RFP, which states: "Eligible Lead Applicants include community-based groups, local 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, public agencies, and California Native American Tribes within the Air District's jurisdiction (the counties of Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Napa, San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Clara, southwestern Solano, and southern Sonoma)."***

***[Organization Name] is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit headquartered in Santa Cruz, California, with programming throughout the Central Coast, the broader West Coast, and nationally. We currently implement programs in both Santa Clara and San Mateo counties that we would intend to leverage for this funding opportunity.***

***Could you please confirm whether lead applicants are required to be physically headquartered or maintain an office within one of the Air District's jurisdictional counties, or whether having active, ongoing programming and demonstrated service reach within those counties would meet the eligibility requirement?***

Proposed projects must be conducted in California's San Francisco Bay Area, within the Air District's jurisdiction. Lead Applicants are not required to be physically headquartered or maintain an office within the Air District's jurisdiction. The People's Air Grant Program will prioritize projects that: have a direct impact on pollution reduction and improvements in health for impacted communities and residents; engage the skills and resources of the community, including engaging in meaningful and collaborative partnerships with other community leaders and organizations serving impacted communities; and/or improve air quality and reduce local air pollution disparities in impacted communities. Projects must also show that the majority of benefits will go to low-income communities.

***C13: We wanted to confirm that Community Air Resources Board (CARB) funding we currently have is not part of the CARB Community Air Grant Fund. We reached out to our contact and they noted the following:***

***"Your [Clean Mobility in Schools] CMIS grant is funded by FY2022 General Fund. Your CMIS grant was selected from a California Climate Investments (CCI) funding program not the same as the Community Air Grants Program. We still administer your CMIS grant under the same requirements as the other CCI grants selected from the solicitation but the funds are actually from the General Fund." We wanted to see if this was something you could also confirm for us that the General Fund is considered separate from the Community Air Grant Fund and thus we'd be able to apply for this opportunity.***

Organizations and entities that have not been awarded funding through the Air District's James Cary Smith Community Grant Program and/or the California Air Resources Board's Community Air Grant Program are eligible to apply for a People's Air Grant as either a Lead Applicant or a Subgrantee if they meet all other eligibility requirements noted in the People's Air Grant Request for Applications. Therefore, organizations that have received CMIS funding may still be eligible to apply, provided they meet all other eligibility requirements.

***C14: The County of [Redacted] Public Health Department has received funding in the past for individual in-home air purifiers as well as for congregate settings. Can you confirm if the funding for those two grants [was] through Assembly Bill 617? We are not sure if the county has been awarded funding that may not make us eligible for this.***

The funding that the County previously received from the Air District does not make the County ineligible for the People's Air Grant Program. Organizations and entities that have not been awarded funding through the Air District's James Cary Smith Community Grant Program and/or the California Air Resources Board's Community Air Grant Program are eligible to apply for a People's Air Grant as either a Lead Applicant or a Subgrantee if they meet all other eligibility requirements noted in the People's Air Grant Request for Applications

***C15: I'm the new Executive Director for [Organization Name]. We are very interested in this grant, but I want to make sure we are eligible. As best as I can tell we haven't been the recipients of any conflicting funding sources (Assembly Bill 617, etc.) but I'm not 100% sure! Is someone at the Air District able to answer this question?***

The Air District's records do not show that [Organization Name] has received a James Cary Smith Community Grant or Assembly Bill 617 implementation funds through the Bay Area Air District. Organizations and entities that have not been awarded funding through the Air District's James Cary Smith Community Grant Program and/or over \$25,000 total in funding through the Air District's implementation of Assembly Bill 617 are eligible to apply for a People's Air Grant as either a Lead Applicant or a Subgrantee if they meet the other eligibility requirements noted in the People's Air Grant Request for Applications.

***C16: I'm reaching out to confirm eligibility for the current grant opportunity. The guidelines are very clear, but I wanted to double-check our specific situation to ensure we interpret them correctly. Our organization previously received funding through the Air District's James Cary Smith Community Grant Program in 2022, as well as a California Air Resources Board (CARB) Community Air Grant in 2024. Based on Section 6.3, which states that organizations previously or currently awarded funding through these programs are ineligible, I wanted to confirm that our previous JCS and CARB grants would make us ineligible to apply for this opportunity.***

Based on the information you provided, your organization is not eligible to apply as a Lead Applicant or Subgrantee for the People's Air Grant Program because the organization previously received funding through the Air District's James Cary Smith Community Grant Program and a California Air Resources Board Community Air Grant. ## **D) Application Process**

***D1: Where/when can we find a recorded archive of the Information Webinar?***

***D2: I am not able to access the recording information from the Information Session on March 24th. May I have a link?***

***D3: How should an applicant apply?***

Prospective applicants should review the People's Air Grant Request for Applications document found at [www.baaqmd.gov/peoplesairgrant](http://www.baaqmd.gov/peoplesairgrant), including Appendix A, the application checklist. Applicants will create an account on an online platform called SlideRoom. All applications must be submitted online through the SlideRoom portal prior to the application deadline. ***D4: Can't figure out how to access the workplan and budget templates.***

***D5: The RFA calls for a Work Plan using the Air District's template (required template I believe), and a project budget form (optional template) and says to find these forms on the website, but I wasn't able to find them. Help please?***

***D6: You said up to 2 letters of support. Is that a minimum or a maximum?***

Applicants may submit a maximum of two letters of support. For more information, please see Appendix A of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications.

***D7: Are all application materials supposed to be submitted through SlideRoom?***

Yes, applications must be submitted via the online application portal, SlideRoom, found at <https://peoplesairgrant.slideroom.com/#/Login>. For more information, please see Section 9 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications.

***D8: Does "Additional funding" [on the optional Project Budget template] mean explaining our entire budget or just budget for the specific program we are applying for?***

The second tab of the Project Budget template invites prospective applicants to share additional sources of funding. Applicants do not need to explain their entire budget.

***D9: I'm sorry that I arrived late. Will recordings [of the webinars] be available?***

## E) Eligible Communities

***E1: The RFA states "Eligibility for the Peoples Air Grant Program includes the four designated AB617 Communities". Please clarify, if the project is not in one of the four designated AB617 communities in the Bay Area Air District jurisdiction, it is not eligible for this funding. Correct?***

A project does not need to be in one of the four designated Assembly Bill 617 communities to be eligible. The project should serve communities within the Bay Area Air District's jurisdiction that are most impacted by air pollution and [environmental] injustices, as identified by CalEnviroScreen 4.0 or other public agency environmental health screening tools. The People's Air Grant Program will prioritize projects that: have a direct impact on pollution reduction and improvements in health for impacted communities and residents; engage the skills and resources of the community, including engaging in meaningful and collaborative partnerships with other community leaders and organizations serving impacted communities; and/or improve air quality and reduce local air pollution disparities in impacted communities. Projects must also show that the majority of benefits will go to low-income communities.

***E2: How will an applicant be prioritized if their jurisdiction includes both top 30% priority areas and areas outside that threshold?***

The application for the People's Air Grant Program asks applicants to provide a description of the community or communities that the project would serve. The People's Air Grant Program will prioritize projects that: have a direct impact on pollution reduction and improvements in health for impacted communities and residents; engage the skills and resources of the community, including engaging in meaningful and collaborative partnerships with other community leaders and organizations serving impacted communities; and/or improve air quality and reduce local air pollution disparities in impacted communities. Projects must also show that the majority of benefits will go to low-income communities.

***E3: Map of your current projects. Communities with gaps in planning/services.***

There is no map of all current Bay Area Air District projects; however, prospective applicants are invited to view an interactive map showing the Bay Area's four designated AB 617 communities: <https://arcg.is/5naS90>. This map also shows communities in the Air District's jurisdiction with an overall CalEnviroScreen 4.0 score of 70 to 100. The People's Air Grant Program will prioritize projects based on communities that appear in pink and/or blue on the map. Note that applicants may also rely on other environmental health screening tools developed by public agencies that identify environmental justice communities. ***E4: Would Berkeley, specifically West and South Berkeley be competitive for this grant since only 1-2 census tracts are eligible?***

Applicants with compelling projects are invited to apply. The People's Air Grant Program will prioritize projects that: have a direct impact on pollution reduction and improvements in health for impacted communities and residents; engage the skills and resources of the community, including engaging in meaningful and collaborative partnerships with other community leaders and organizations serving impacted communities; and/or Improve air quality and reduce local air pollution disparities in impacted communities. Projects must also show that the majority of benefits will go to low-income communities.

***E5: Do you fund projects by Bay Area organizations that focus on non-Bay Area communities?***

Proposed projects must be conducted in California's San Francisco Bay Area, within the Air District's jurisdiction. For an interactive map, please visit: <https://arcg.is/5naS90>.

***E6: Just want to confirm, are we allowed to apply from the Central Valley, or this is only for the bay area?***

Proposed projects must be conducted in California's San Francisco Bay Area, within the Air District's jurisdiction. For an interactive map, please visit: <https://arcg.is/5naS90>.

***E7: Can you confirm if Monterey County would be eligible based on the counties outlined in what I have read?***

Monterey County is not an eligible geography for the People's Air Grant Program because it is not within the Bay Area Air District's jurisdiction. For information about the Monterey Bay Air Resources District, please visit <https://www.mbard.org/>.

***E8: In the community needs scoring is there a preference for the CalEnviroScreen top 30% or for the Assembly Bill 617 Boundaries? Is there more credit for both?***

No, proposed applications will not receive additional points if they identify proposed projects in communities that have an overall CalEnviroScreen score of 70 to 100 and are also within a designated Assembly Bill 617 community. The People's Air Grant Program will prioritize projects that: have a direct impact on pollution reduction and improvements in health for impacted communities and residents; engage the skills and resources of the community, including engaging in meaningful and collaborative partnerships with other community leaders and organizations serving impacted communities; and/or improve air quality and reduce local air pollution disparities in impacted communities. Projects must also show that the majority of benefits will go to low-income communities.

***Eg: I'm not clear about the eligibility still. I reviewed the slides and watched the video. I saw in the questions they noted that you do not need to be in a priority area to receive funding. This seems to be slightly different from the slides. Can you clarify in writing? Is Oakland Chinatown eligible? It's in pink within the district, but not within a priority area. It's not entirely clear.***

Projects do not need to be located within an Assembly Bill 617 community to be eligible. Projects must serve communities within the Bay Area Air District's jurisdiction that are most impacted by air pollution and environmental injustices, as identified by CalEnviroScreen 4.0 or other public agency environmental health screening tools, and must demonstrate that the majority of benefits will go to low-income individuals or communities (defined as below 80% of Area Median Income). The People's Air Grant Program will prioritize projects that: have a direct impact on pollution reduction and improvements in health for impacted communities and residents; engage the skills and resources of the community, including engaging in meaningful and collaborative partnerships with other community leaders and organizations serving impacted communities; and/or improve air quality and reduce local air pollution disparities in impacted communities. Oakland Chinatown may be eligible if the proposed project meets these criteria and clearly demonstrates benefit to impacted communities.

***E10: Please go over the requirements for the definition of communities that benefit from the project. Is there a Cal EnviroScreen requirement. We're in Napa County looking to benefit farmworkers, who don't live in any particular census track.***

A project does not need to be in one of the four designated Assembly Bill 617 communities to be eligible. Projects must serve communities within the Air District's jurisdiction that are most impacted by air pollution and environmental injustices. CalEnviroScreen 4.0 or other public agency environmental health screening tools may be used to help demonstrate this information. Applicants are required to describe the community or communities their project would serve. For more information, please see Section 3 and Appendix A of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications.

***E11: My understanding from the earlier webinar was that a specific disadvantaged community was not required for eligibility. For instance, farmworkers have exposure to pollutants, but this is not census-tract driven. Can you please say more about the eligibility requirements?***

Projects must serve communities within the Air District's jurisdiction that are most impacted by air pollution and environmental injustices. CalEnviroScreen 4.0 or other public agency environmental health screening tools may be used to help demonstrate this information. Applicants are required to describe the community or communities their project would serve. The People's Air Grant Program will prioritize projects that: have a direct impact on pollution reduction and improvements in health for impacted communities and residents; engage the skills and resources of the community, including engaging in meaningful and collaborative partnerships with other community leaders and organizations serving impacted communities; and/or improve air quality and reduce local air pollution disparities in impacted communities. Projects must also show that the majority of

benefits will go to low-income communities. For more information, please see Section 3 and Appendix A of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications.

## F) Grant Awards and Reporting

### ***F1: How many applicants are chosen per county?***

The Air District does not set a specific number of awards by county. Eligible applications will be scored using the scoring rubric found in the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, and staff will then consider factors such as available funding, geographic distribution, and project type when developing funding recommendations. For more information, please see Section 10 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications.

### ***F2: Will projects/proposals that align with more than one of the project types score higher?***

No. All project proposals are evaluated based on the specific scoring criteria outlined in Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications. Scoring is determined by how effectively a proposal meets those criteria, rather than the number of project types it aligns with.

### ***F3: The application process and deliverables if we receive the grant.***

The webinars on 3/24/26 and 4/9/26 provided detailed information about the application process for the People's Air Grant Program. Regarding deliverables - if an applicant is awarded a grant, Air District staff will work with the applicant to develop a grant agreement that includes deliverables and reporting requirements.

### ***F4: What are the reporting requirements for grantees? Do grantees receive grant funds upfront, staggered, or reimbursement-based?***

All funded projects must submit regular progress reports and one final project summary report. The payment schedule will be established in the grant agreement for each project and will be considered as often as triannually, three times per year. No funds will be released until the grant agreement has been fully executed by the grantee and the Air District. An initial payment can be issued within 30 days after execution of the grant agreement. For more information, please see Section 11 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications. These grants will be deliverables-based rather than reimbursement-based.

### ***F5: Can you address the nature of grant reporting?***

All funded projects must submit regular progress reports and deliverables, and one final project summary report. The reporting schedule will be established in the grant agreement for each project. The Air District will provide report templates for each grantee. These grants will be deliverables-based rather than reimbursement-based.

***F6: Is the grant inaugural? If not, can you share past projects that were funded through the People's Air Grant?***

The People's Air Grant Program is a one-time grant program. Since it has not been offered before, the Air District isn't able to share a list of past projects funded.

***F7: Is a grant from Bay Area Air District also considered a federal grant?***

No. A grant from the Bay Area Air District is not a federal grant.

***F8: What is the total fund for grants?***

A total of \$3 million is available for grants through the People's Air Grant Program.

## **G) Project Eligibility**

***G1: Does our project need to do a combination of the 4 types of projects, or can we only focus on one or two of them?***

A project does not need to include a combination of the four project types outlined in the People's Air Grant Request for Applications; it may focus on one or two. However, please keep in mind that applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project and the extent to which it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

***G2: Can a project include education and implementation elements?***

One of the four project types for the People's Air Grant is "provide education regarding the health impacts of air pollution and pollution mitigation initiatives." All applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project and the extent to which it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

***G3: Are active transportation education programs eligible?***

Active transportation education programs may be eligible for funding. Applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project and the extent to which it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

***G4: Could these funds be used to train community leaders (Promotoras/Community Health Workers) to conduct education and in-home trigger assessments?***

A project of this type may be eligible for funding. Applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project and the extent to which it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

***G5: How does air quality play into masking and respiratory diseases & health?***

When inhaled, pollutants can aggravate the lungs and may also worsen chronic respiratory diseases, such as asthma. Masking is not directly addressed in the People's Air Grant Request for Applications. There are several considerations for masking, including the type of mask, its fit, and the individual's age. ***G6: Would an urban forestry project that focuses on planting more trees to improve air quality meet the grant requirements?***

An urban forestry project may be eligible for funding. Applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project and the extent to which it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

***G7: I would like to know how this grant opportunity aligns with people of African ancestry that have chronic health issues.***

The People's Air Grant Program can support health care resources and services in order to improve health outcomes for people experiencing health impacts related to air pollution exposure in vulnerable communities. For more information, please see Section 8 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, What Kind of Work Can Be Funded.

***G8: Would a project that mainly addresses indoor air quality qualify?***

A project of this type may be eligible for funding. Applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project and the extent to which it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

***G9: We operate a shelter for women and children experiencing homelessness in a priority community. Would projects that improve indoor air quality—such as installing HEPA filtration systems or upgrading HVAC to reduce wildfire smoke exposure—be potentially eligible for funding, under the 'implement mitigation initiatives' category?***

A project of this type may be eligible for funding. Applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project and the extent to which it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

***G10: Can you use this grant for events that support climate change?***

A project with events related to climate change may be eligible for funding. Applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project and the extent to which it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

***G11: Given the mission of Bay Area Air District, is there a benefit in proposing a project that has demonstrated air quality and climate benefits?***

A project that has demonstrated air quality and climate benefits may be eligible for funding. Applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project and the extent to which it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

***G12: Are the mitigation efforts limited to the 3 examples in the slides?***

No. The three examples provided in the webinar recording are for reference and do not represent an exhaustive list. The Air District encourages diverse proposals across the four eligible project types. Applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project and the extent to which it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

***G13: Are existing projects/programs eligible or does the proposed project need to be a new initiative?***

Proposed projects do not need to be new initiatives. Ongoing programs are eligible if they meet the criteria outlined in the Request for Applications and demonstrate strong community alignment. All applicants should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project and the extent to which it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

***G14: We are currently in the process of electrifying our City fleet. We are currently transitioning several of our Public Works vehicles and will next target our Police vehicles. Would it be possible to use the People's Air Grant Program funding towards:***

- Charger infrastructure to install 10 Ford chargers at our Police Department (which falls within your impacted communities map) which will be used as we continue to transition our gas police cars into EV police cars.***
- BEAM EV arc – which is a 100% renewable, transportable, off-grid EV charging option – at our Police Department for the same transitioning vehicles described above.***

Applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project and the extent to which it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. *G15: We are now hoping to similarly electrify our Police fleet. The community would directly benefit from reduced air pollution because the project would entail the purchase of EV vehicles to replace gas-powered vehicles, which would reduce emissions into the atmosphere. Your grant funding, however, would be used for the construction/ infrastructure component, as opposed to funding the vehicles. I also checked and the Police Department scores 53 on the CalEnviroScreen 4.0, however, the surrounding communities score 67 and 83, and all would benefit from the reduction in our carbon footprint. Can you please confirm that EV-related construction and equipment qualify as eligible costs?*

The Air District does not anticipate prioritizing EV-related construction and equipment projects through this funding opportunity. The People's Air Grant Program will prioritize projects that: have a direct impact on pollution reduction and improvements in health for impacted communities and residents; engage the skills and resources of the community, including engaging in meaningful and collaborative partnerships with other community leaders and organizations serving impacted communities; and/or improve air quality and reduce local air pollution disparities in impacted communities. Projects must also show that the majority of benefits will go to low-income communities.

*G16: Can the grant go towards capital improvements like improved filtration systems in public buildings or community spaces?*

A project of this type may be eligible for funding. Applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project and the extent to which it reflects community-driven needs. Projects must also show that the majority of benefits will go to low-income communities. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

***G17: Would the purchase of electric vehicles be an allowable cost for the People's Air Grant?***

The Air District does not anticipate prioritizing electric vehicle-related projects through this funding opportunity. The People's Air Grant Program will prioritize projects that: have a direct impact on pollution reduction and improvements in health for impacted communities and residents; engage the skills and resources of the community, including engaging in meaningful and collaborative partnerships with other community leaders and organizations serving impacted communities; and/or improve air quality and reduce local air pollution disparities in impacted communities. Projects must also show that the majority of benefits will go to low-income communities.

***G18: We are interested in applying for the People's Air Grant this year with the goal of doing tree planting with pollinator-supporting tree species. I wanted to check to see if this would qualify for this grant program. Also, would other green space work, such as planting smaller shrubs and other vegetation, qualify?***

Projects of that nature may be eligible for funding. Applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project, and to what extent it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

***G19: I'm reaching out to see if a specific project might be eligible for the People's Air Grant Program. We have just completed convening a Community Advisory Committee (CAC) to inform [City Name]'s Environmental Justice and Safety Elements, including priorities related to air quality (e.g., freeway exposure, wildfire smoke, and cumulative impacts). The Elements will be rolled out by the City, but we hope to secure funding to enable the CAC to participate in drafting and sharing the Safety and Environmental Justice Element with the community.***

***We're exploring funding to support stipends for CAC member organizations and ongoing facilitation to ensure continued community participation in this process. The CAC is composed of community-based organizations representing residents who closely align with the program's priority populations, including low-income communities and communities disproportionately impacted by air pollution. This next phase would also support community-led outreach and engagement around air quality and climate resilience. Would this type of work, focused on community***

## ***participation and engagement tied to city policy, be eligible under the People's Air Grant Program?***

A project of this type may be eligible for funding. Applicants for a People's Air Grant should demonstrate the origin of the proposed project, and to what extent it reflects community-driven needs. Applicants should also address alignment with existing community priorities or initiatives, and address how relevant communities will be engaged in all phases of the project. For more information, please see Section 10.2 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications, Application Scoring Criteria.

## **H) Subgrantees / Partnerships**

### ***H1: Is there a cap on the amount of funds that a subgrantee could receive relative to the lead applicant?***

There is no cap on the amount of funds that a Subgrantee could receive relative to the Lead Applicant. In some situations, the Lead Applicant would be a fiscal sponsor, and the Subgrantee would be a community-based organization that does not have its own 501(c)(3) status but is implementing the project.

### ***H2: Can subgrantees be consultants? Can subgrantees pay consultants with their subgrants?***

A private consultant is not eligible to be a Subgrantee for the People's Air Grant. Consultant services would be an eligible cost, capped at 25% of the project budget. Subgrantees can pay consultants with their subgrants. For more information, please see Sections 6.2 and 8.3 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications.

### ***H3: Can a nonprofit (lead grantee) partner with a health equity consulting firm as a sub-grantee (not a non-profit)?***

A private consulting firm would not be an eligible Subgrantee. However, please note that professional service consultants are an eligible project cost, as long as consultant costs are below 25% of the budget. For more information, please see Sections 6.2 and 8.3 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications.

### ***H4: Is there a document that would allow potential applicants to partner if they are looking to subcontract, etc.?***

No. The Air District does not maintain a list of prospective applicants or partners for the People's Air Grant Program. Organizations interested in partnering or subcontracting are encouraged to connect independently through their existing networks.

***H5: Does each collaborating agency have to be a 501(C)3? In some cases it may be a contract for a company to do the proposed work.***

For a list of eligible Subgrantees, please see Section 6.1 of the People's Air Grant Request for Applications. A private consultant is not eligible to be a Subgrantee for the People's Air Grant. However, consultant services would be an eligible cost for funded projects, capped at 25% of the project budget.
